Department Organization

The Department of Public Safety employs 25 full and part-time personnel. Because of its dual purpose mission (both Police and Fire), all police personnel are trained as firefighters. The Public Safety operation is unique among police departments and has proven very effective in the City of Waverly.


In 2015, we were authorized 12 full time Public Safety (Police) Officers, one records clerk, 1 Codes/Fire Inspector and 15 part-time Firefighters. Of the current 11 part-time Firefighters, two are full time city employees in the Street Department and Water Department who received a firefighting pay supplement, and the remaining 9 are community members who are paid per call-out.

The department is directed by the Chief of Public Safety, Grant Gillespie. There are two Captains who direct the Police and Fire Divisions. Captain Devin Elliott oversees the Police Department's Patrol and Special Operations Division, while Captain Larry Lescure oversees Fire Operations.

The Department of Public Safety operates on a total annual budget of \$1,341,042.00 for Police and Fire.


The Police Department is an accredited agency under the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police's Tennessee Law Enforcement Accreditation program.



Special Response Team

The Special Response Team (SRT) is comprised of specially trained officers who respond to situations outside the normal capabilities of patrol. SRT members are trained in high risk warrant service, barricaded subjects, hostage situations and other unusual occurrences. Members are subject to call-out 24/7 and receive specialized training on a monthly basis. Detective Jonathan Fortner is the SRT Team Leader.





In addition to the basic police academy, all officers receive a minimum of 40 P.O.S.T. required hours of in-service training each year. The police department sends each officer to specialized schools that exceed the 40 hour minimum training. In addition, officers complete the fire academy and receive yearly in-service training in fire/rescue.

Training in 2015 included topics such as Instructor Development, ASP Instructor, Handcuffing Instructor, DUI, Reality Pistol Combatives, Fusion Center, Criminal Drug Interdiction, Leadership Training and Domestic Abuse. Our in house in-service included over 17 topics including use of force, emergency vehicle operation and criminal investigations. Officers exceeded the minimum of 40 hours of police training and averaged 65 hours each of training in 2015. With an additional average of 40 hours of fire training all officers received well over 100 hours of training.









Training

Police Department – Criminal Investigations

The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is responsible for criminal and drug investigations. CID reports directly to the Chief of Police. Detective Jonathan Fortner is assigned full time to CID.

Detectives conduct drug investigations and investigate general property and violent crime cases. Detective Fortner also serves in the role of Evidence Custodian. CID is responsible for registration of sex offenders.

As the need arises, members of the Patrol Division are assigned to CID to assist with investigations. Sergeant Michael Hubbs is currently assigned on an as needed basis and oversees sex offender registration.

Records/Municipal Court

The Records Division is staffed by one full-time employee, Melinda Bumpus, our Records Clerk/Municipal Court Clerk.

The Records Division is responsible for maintaining all Department records, including Incident and Traffic Crash Reports. The Records Clerk reviews and submits the Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System (TIBRS) data which includes our crime statistics. Additional duties include maintaining all Municipal Court Records and submitting Court Action Reports to the TN Department of Safety.

Municipal Court meets Bi-Monthly and handles all violations of City Ordinances and Traffic laws. The Municipal Court Judge is Haylee Bradley-Maples.

The Records Division is open Monday-Friday from 8am-4:30pm, except holidays or when the Records Clerk has to be away for training and personal time.

Fire Department

Fire operations are led by Captain Larry Lescure. The Fire Department is staffed with Public Safety Officers as well as Part-Time Firefighters. Since the DPS was formed in 2004, Police Officers (now called Public Safety Officers) are now all cross-trained as Firefighters which allows the Fire Department to maintain 24/7 staffing. In addition to the PSO's, the department is supplemented by full-time City Employees who are also cross-trained as Firefighters as well as paid per call members from within the community.

All members of the department attend the Basic Firefighter's Academy and complete monthly in-service training. All members are in on-call status 24/7 to handle fire and rescue calls within the city.

The city maintains 2 Fire Stations in the City of Waverly, one being on the Public Safety Complex at 103 East Main St. and the other on West Main near Hwy 70 West. The current ISO rating of the department is a 4. ISO assigns a rating of 10 (lowest) to 1 (highest) to community fire departments based on the level of fire fighting readiness. ISO examines the department's communications, training, equipment, personnel, and water supply. More information can be found on ISO's website at www.iso.com.

Each Police Officer is assigned a patrol vehicle based on their assignment. Most officers drive police package Ford Police Interceptors. Supervisors and Detectives are assigned unmarked or plain vehicles. Each year, the department replaces worn vehicles either through the regular police budget or the special drug fund which is funded through drug fines and forfeitures. In 2015, the department was authorized to purchase 2 Ford Police Interceptor SUV's to replace older cars. They will be in service in Early 2016.

The Fire Department currently has 4 Fire Engines (Pumpers), three support vehicles, and a retired antique engine used for parades and community events. Our parade truck, Engine 1, received a frame up restoration this year (see news section). Service 2 was replaced with a used 2005 Ford Explorer this year.

Activity

The Department of Public Safety responded to 6,158 law enforcement calls for service and 35 fire related calls for service in 2015. Officers made 3,387 traffic stops during the year, and investigated a total of 135 property damage traffic crashes. In addition, there were 22 injury crashes resulting in 31 total injuries and two fatalities.

The following are reported TIBRS (Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System) offenses for the past 5 years. The 2015 clearance rate for all cases was 72.59% (meaning cases were cleared by arrest or the offender was identified but not charged).

Engine 1 (a 1942 Dodge Pirsch Pumper) received a complete frame up restoration this year as a gift to the City. Dave and Linda Miles, owners of Pipestone Restorations commissioned the restoration. Rusty Puckett (of Pipestone) and his son Paul did the restoration. The 73 year old fire truck is believed to be the first truck to have been purchased by the City of Waverly.





Capt. Lescure Assumes Additional Responsibilities

With the retirement of Mrs. Richie Blue, our long time City Codes Inspector, those duties were assigned to Captain Larry Lescure. Captain Lescure began preparing for the additional duties at the beginning of the year and assumed the responsibilities July 1.

Captain Lescure is trained and certified as a Fire Inspector and can conduct fire safety inspections for businesses in the city. Captain Lescure has completed a number of courses in building codes enforcement and fire inspection at the TN Fire and Codes Academy in Bell Buckle, TN.

Captain Lescure joined the Waverly Police Department in 1989 and is currently the Fire Captain. He remains a sworn Police Officer and is responsible for Fire Operations as well as the Department's fleet management.

Citizens Police Academy Session 9

Session 9 of the Citizens Police Academy was held from September – November. The class included 11 weeks of sessions that inform the cadets of many of the aspects of the job of our Public Safety Officers. Booker DeRousse was selected for this year's Top Gun Award.



Back-up Cameras Funded by TML Grant

Each apparatus in the Fire Department received back-up cameras from a grant provided by our insurance carrier, TML Risk Management Pool. The "Safety Partners" grant provided a 50% match for the cost of the cameras. The cameras allow the driver an in-cab view of the blind spots behind fire trucks and help to reduce accidents and improve firefighter safety.

Highway Safety Grant – New Camera Technology

The Police Department received a \$5,000.00 grant from the Governor's Highway Safety Office under their High Visibility Law Enforcement Campaign.

The grant was 100% and enabled the department to purchase a new vehicle camera system. We began changing technology from DVD based recording to recording via hard drive technology this year. Transfer of the system is by USB drive to a storage server.

As more cameras are added to the fleet, video will be transferred via wireless technology to the server. The new systems add HD quality video and high quality audio.



WDPS Partners with State Fire Marshal to Provide Home Smoke Alarms

The State Fire Marshal's Office presented the Waverly Fire Department with a supply of smoke alarms to be installed in homes within the community at high risk of fire. The department personnel attended an information session and training course on the new alarms, which utilize a battery with a 10-year lifespan.

Several alarms were installed in homes throughout Waverly in the on-going program.

Officer Jeremy Brooks organized two blood drives in 2015. The blood drives were held at the Police Department and exceeded the goals set for each drive.

Community Events

Each year, the 4th grade class from Waverly Junior High School visits the Department for a field trip. This year, the students enjoyed a tour of the Police Department, 911 Center, and Fire Hall. Officer David Ross and K9 Crockett did a demonstration. The kids enjoyed hot dogs served by staff from the Police Department and 911 Center.

The department enjoys several visits from various classes, scouting organizations and other groups each year.

Movie Theatre Ad
