# 2017 Annual Report

I am very pleased to present the 2017 Annual Report for the City of Waverly Department of Public Safety. This report highlights many of our achievements for the year.

The Police Department received it's second award of accreditation through the TN Association of Chiefs of Police, making it one of only a handful of departments across the state to be accredited. Accreditation brings the assurance that we comply with our industry standards in all our operations, and I am proud of our Officers who uphold these standards on a daily basis.

In 2016, we began the process of replacing our aging air packs in the Fire Department. The new air packs provide much greater safety features and allow firefighters to stay on air longer. Our replacement cycle will continue for the next few years until all of our packs have been replaced.

Our fleet replacement program has replaced several aging and worn out vehicles over the past several years, using mostly funding from our Special Drug Fund. I am pleased to report that we have a fleet that is in great shape and we will be in a better position to affordably maintain our fleet in the coming years.

It is my honour to serve as your Chief of Public Safety. Our Officers and Firefighters enjoy and appreciate the great support we receive from the members of our community on a daily basis.

### **Department Organization**

The Department of Public Safety employs 25 full and part-time personnel. Because of its dual purpose mission (both Police and Fire), all police personnel are trained as firefighters. The Public Safety operation is unique among police departments and has proven very effective in the City of Waverly.

In 2017, we were authorized 12 full time Public Safety (Police) Officers, one records clerk, 1 Codes/Fire Inspector and 15 part-time Firefighters. Of the current 15 part-time Firefighters, one is a full time city employee in the Street Department and who received a firefighting pay supplement, and the remaining ones are community members who are paid per call-out.


The department is directed by the Chief of Public Safety, Grant Gillespie. There are two Captains who direct the Police and Fire Divisions. Captain Devin Elliott oversees the Police Department's Patrol and Special Operations Division, while Captain Larry Lescure oversees Fire Operations.

The Department of Public Safety operates on a total annual budget of \$1,404,080.00 for Police and Fire.

The Police Department is an accredited agency under the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police's Tennessee Law Enforcement Accreditation program.








# **Organizational Chart**



#### **K9 Team**

#### **Special Response Team**

The Special Response Team (SRT) is comprised of specially trained officers who respond to situations outside the normal capabilities of patrol. SRT members are trained in high risk warrant service, barricaded subjects, hostage situations and other unusual occurrences. Members are subject to call-out 24/7 and receive specialized training on a monthly basis. Detective Jonathan Fortner is the SRT Team Leader.





In addition to the basic police academy, all officers receive a minimum of 40 P.O.S.T. required hours of in-service training each year. The police department sends each officer to specialized schools that exceed the 40 hour minimum training. In addition, officers complete the fire academy and receive yearly in-service training in fire/rescue.

Training in 2017 included topics such as Instructor Development, DUI, Advanced Vice and Narcotics, Use of Force Analysis, EVOC Instructor, Bias Based Policing, Critical Decision Making Instructor, Leadership Training and Domestic Abuse. Our in house in-service included over 17 topics including use of force, emergency vehicle operation and criminal investigations. Officers exceeded the minimum of 40 hours of police training and averaged XX hours each of training in 2017. With an additional average of 40 hours of fire training all officers received well over 115 hours of training.









# **Training**

### Police Department - Criminal Investigations

The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is responsible for criminal and drug investigations. CID reports directly to the Chief of Police. Detective Jonathan Fortner and Detective Mike Hubbs are assigned full time to CID.

Detectives conduct drug investigations and investigate general property and violent crime cases. Detective Fortner also serves in the role of Evidence Custodian. Detective Hubbs is responsible for registration of sex offenders.

As the need arises, members of the Patrol Division are assigned to CID to assist with investigations.

### Records/Municipal Court

The Records Division is staffed by one full-time employee, Melinda Bumpus, our Records Clerk/Municipal Court Clerk.

The Records Division is responsible for maintaining all Department records, including Incident and Traffic Crash Reports. The Records Clerk reviews and submits the Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System (TIBRS) data which includes our crime statistics. Additional duties include maintaining all Municipal Court Records and submitting Court Action Reports to the TN Department of Safety.

Municipal Court meets Bi-Monthly and handles all violations of City Ordinances and Traffic laws. The Municipal Court Judge is Haylee Bradley-Maples.

The Records Division is open Monday-Friday from 8am-4:30pm, except holidays or when the Records Clerk has to be away for training and personal time.

# Fire Department

Fire operations are led by Captain Larry Lescure. The Fire Department is staffed with Public Safety Officers as well as Part-Time Firefighters. Since the DPS was formed in 2004, Police Officers (now called Public Safety Officers) are now all cross-trained as Firefighters which allows the Fire Department to maintain 24/7 staffing. In addition to the PSO's, the department is supplemented by full-time City Employees who are also cross-trained as Firefighters as well as paid per call members from within the community. Captain Lescure also serves as the Codes Enforcement Officer and Fire Inspector for the City of Waverly.

All members of the department attend the Basic Firefighter's Academy and complete monthly inservice training. All members are in on-call status 24/7 to handle fire and rescue calls within the city.

The city maintains 2 Fire Stations in the City of Waverly, one being on the Public Safety Complex at 103 East Main St. and the other on West Main near Hwy 70 West. The current ISO rating of the department is a 4. ISO assigns a rating of 10 (lowest) to 1 (highest) to community fire departments based on the level of fire fighting readiness. ISO examines the department's communications, training, equipment, personnel, and water supply. More information can be found on ISO's website at www.iso.com.

Each Police Officer is assigned a patrol vehicle based on their assignment. Supervisors and Detectives are assigned unmarked or plain vehicles. Each year, the department replaces worn vehicles either through the regular police budget or the special drug fund which is funded through drug fines and forfeitures. In 2017, the department replaced the last remaining marked Ford Crown Victoria's, and now has a fleet of SUV's which are better suited for our dual purpose role.

The Fire Department currently has 4 Fire Engines (Pumpers), three support vehicles, and a retired antique engine used for parades and community events.



#### **Department Vehicle Fleet**

#### **Activity**

The Department of Public Safety responded to 5,962 law enforcement calls for service and 35 fire related calls for service in 2017. Officers made 2,331 traffic stops during the year, and investigated a total of 95 property damage traffic crashes. In addition, there were 16 injury crashes resulting in 19 total injuries and no fatalities.

The following are reported TIBRS (Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System) offenses for the past 5 years. The 2017 clearance rate for all cases was 77.20% (meaning cases were cleared by arrest or the offender was identified but not charged).

#### Police Officer/Firefighter of the Year

Each year, members of the Police and Fire Divisions vote for an Officer and Firefighter of the Year. The award is taken seriously and is given to the member who best represents what we believe are the values of our organization.

This year's police award was sponsored by Porch-Stribling-Webb Insurance Company and was awarded to Detective Michael Hubbs.

The fire award was sponsored by the Citizens Police Academy Alumni and went to Firefighter Billy Rudolph.



### 2017 Special Incidents and Achievements





Officer Jordan Coble completed the Police Academy and Fire Academy in 2017.

Officer Greg Triplett was re-hired to fill an open position in 2017. Officer Triplett worked for several years with WPD and as the School Resource Officer at WCHS before returning to us.



The Fire Department continued its replacement of Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) in 2017.

The city funded replacement of 14 of the Department's 25 SCBA's in 2016 and approved three additional ones in 2017.

The new packs offer a high pressure 45 minute air bottle which extends the amount of time a firefighter can be on air. They also include a heads up display inside the mask and a digital "PASS" device which sounds an alarm if a firefighter goes into distress or becomes immobilized while in the pack.

The department chose MSA brand packs and plans to continue to replace all of the older packs as funding allows over the next several years.



### Fire Department Air Pack Upgrades

#### Safety Equipment Funded by TML Grant

Our insurance carrier provided funding for cones, barrels and an electronic tablet for use in defensive driver training. The training was provided this year for all city personnel who drive city owned vehicles. The grant was a 50% match and was aimed at reducing property damage crashes.







Funding was also obtained for camera systems for our City Parks. Surveillance Cameras were installed in Richland Avenue Park and Asbury Park resulting in a decrease in vandalism to city property.

#### **Grants**

#### Highway Safety Grant -New Camera Technology

The Police Department received a \$5,000.00 grant from the Governor's Highway Safety Office under their High Visibility Law Enforcement Campaign.

The grant was 100% and enabled the department to purchase a new vehicle camera system. The new technology integrates HD quality panoramic front cameras as well as body cameras which provides more video coverage of incidents.

As more cameras are added to the fleet, video will be transferred via wireless technology to the server.



#### **Community Events**

Each year, the 4<sup>th</sup> grade class from Waverly Junior High School visits the Department for a field trip. This year, the students enjoyed a tour of the Police Department, 911 Center, and Fire Hall. Officer David Ross and K9 Crockett did a demonstration. The kids enjoyed hot dogs served by staff from the Police Department and 911 Center.





We enjoy participating in the Street Festival sponsored by First Baptist Church each year at Halloween!

The department enjoys several visits from various classes, scouting organizations and other groups each year.
