## 2018 Annual Report

I am very pleased to present the 2018 Annual Report for the City of Waverly Department of Public Safety. This report highlights many of our achievements for the year.

This year we saw an increase in drug cases and will continue making drug enforcement a priority as we move into 2019. Like many communities, we have been experiencing the effects of opioid abuse, with increases in overdoses and the use of heroin. We began carrying Narcan, which reverses the effects of an opioid overdose and has already been used 3 times by our officers in 2018 to revive overdose victims who had stopped breathing.

We also continued a series of upgrades to our technology and equipment. This year we replaced a Service Company Truck in the Fire Department and made upgrades to our in-car and body worn camera systems to include a wireless system that automatically uploads our video to our server. We will continue to leverage technology to help us in our mission to keep this community safe as we enter the next year.

It is my honour to serve as your Chief of Public Safety. Our Officers and Firefighters enjoy and appreciate the great support we receive from the members of our community on a daily basis. Thank you for helping us make Waverly a great place to live, work, and play.

#### **Department Organization**

The Department of Public Safety employs 25 full and part-time personnel. Because of its dual purpose mission (both Police and Fire), all police personnel are trained as firefighters. The Public Safety operation is unique among police departments and has proven very effective in the City of Waverly.

In 2018, we were authorized 12 full time Public Safety (Police) Officers, one records clerk, 1 Codes/Fire Inspector and 15 part-time Firefighters. Of the current 15 part-time Firefighters, one is a full time city employee in the Street Department and who received a firefighting pay supplement, and the remaining ones are community members who are paid per call-out.

The department is directed by the Chief of Public Safety, Grant Gillespie. There are two Captains who direct the Police and Fire Divisions. Captain Devin Elliott oversees the Police Department's Patrol and Special Operations Division, while Captain Larry Lescure oversees Fire Operations.


The Department of Public Safety operates on a total annual budget of \$1,480,500.00 for Police and Fire.

The Police Department is an accredited agency under the Tennessee Association of Chiefs of Police's Tennessee Law Enforcement Accreditation program.


## **Special Operations**



#### **K9 Team**

#### **Special Response Team**

The Special Response Team (SRT) is comprised of specially trained officers who respond to situations outside the normal capabilities of patrol. SRT members are trained in high risk warrant service, barricaded subjects, hostage situations and other unusual occurrences. Members are subject to call-out 24/7 and receive specialized training on a monthly basis. Sgt. Shaun Wilson is the SRT Team Leader.





In addition to the basic police academy, all officers receive a minimum of 40 P.O.S.T. required hours of in-service training each year. The police department sends each officer to specialized schools that exceed the 40 hour minimum training. In addition, officers complete the fire academy and receive yearly in-service training in fire/rescue.

Specialized training in 2018 included over 24 topics such as Instructor Development, DUI, Firearms, Leadership Training and Domestic Abuse. Our in house in-service included use of force, emergency vehicle operation, just and fair policing and criminal investigations. Officers exceeded the minimum of 40 hours of required police training and averaged 68 hours each of training in 2018. With an additional average of 40 hours of fire and tactical team training all officers received well over 108 hours of training.





#### Police Department - Criminal Investigations

The Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is responsible for criminal and drug investigations. CID reports directly to the Chief of Police. Detective Jonathan Fortner and Detective Mike Hubbs are assigned full time to CID.

Detectives conduct drug investigations and investigate general property and violent crime cases. Detective Fortner also serves in the role of Evidence Custodian. Detective Hubbs is responsible for registration of sex offenders.

As the need arises, members of the Patrol Division are assigned to CID to assist with investigations.

#### Records/Municipal Court

The Records Division is staffed by one full-time employee, Melinda Bumpus, our Records Clerk/Municipal Court Clerk.

The Records Division is responsible for maintaining all Department records, including Incident and Traffic Crash Reports. The Records Clerk reviews and submits the Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System (TIBRS) data which includes our crime statistics. Additional duties include maintaining all Municipal Court Records and submitting Court Action Reports to the TN Department of Safety.

Municipal Court meets Bi-Monthly and handles all violations of City Ordinances and Traffic laws. The Municipal Court Judge is Haylee Bradley-Maples.

The Records Division is open Monday-Friday from 8am-4:30pm, except holidays or when the Records Clerk has to be away for training and personal time.

## Fire Department

Fire operations are led by Captain Larry Lescure. The Fire Department is staffed with Public Safety Officers as well as Part-Time Firefighters. Since the DPS was formed in 2004, Police Officers (now called Public Safety Officers) are now all cross-trained as Firefighters which allows the Fire Department to maintain 24/7 staffing. In addition to the PSO's, the department is supplemented by full-time City Employees who are also cross-trained as Firefighters as well as paid per call members from within the community. Captain Lescure also serves as the Codes Enforcement Officer and Fire Inspector for the City of Waverly.

All members of the department attend the Basic Firefighter's Academy and complete monthly inservice training. All members are in on-call status 24/7 to handle fire and rescue calls within the city.

The city maintains 2 Fire Stations in the City of Waverly, one being on the Public Safety Complex at 103 East Main St. and the other on West Main near Hwy 70 West. The current ISO rating of the department is a 4. ISO assigns a rating of 10 (lowest) to 1 (highest) to community fire departments based on the level of fire fighting readiness. ISO examines the department's communications, training, equipment, personnel, and water supply. More information can be found on ISO's website at www.iso.com.

Each Police Officer is assigned a patrol vehicle based on their assignment. Supervisors and Detectives are assigned unmarked or plain vehicles. Each year, the department replaces worn vehicles either through the regular police budget or the special drug fund which is funded through drug fines and forfeitures. The department now has a fleet of SUV's which are better suited for our dual purpose role.

The Fire Department currently has 4 Fire Engines (Pumpers), three support vehicles, and a retired antique engine used for parades and community events.



#### **Department Vehicle Fleet**

#### **Activity**

The Department of Public Safety responded to 5,818 law enforcement calls for service and 35 fire related calls for service in 2018. Officers made 3,126 traffic stops during the year, and investigated a total of 123 property damage traffic crashes. In addition, there were 20 injury crashes resulting in 32 total injuries and no fatalities.

The following are reported TIBRS (Tennessee Incident Based Reporting System) offenses for the past 5 years. The 2018 clearance rate for all cases was 81.27% (meaning cases were cleared by arrest or the offender was identified but not charged).


This year's police award was sponsored by Porch-Stribling-Webb Insurance Company and was awarded to Officer Jordan Coble.

#### 2018 Special Incidents and Achievements

#### **WPD Welcomes New Officer**



Officer Chase Coble completed the Police Academy and Fire Academy in 2018.

Officer Coble was hired in January to fill a vacancy created when Officer Jeremy Brooks resigned to take a position at Hood Container. Officer Coble was previously employed as a 911 Dispatcher with Humphreys County 911.



#### Fire Department - Service 1 Replacement

The Fire Department replaced its Service Company vehicle this year. The old Service Company was a re-purposed 80's bookmobile. We were able to locate a surplus U.S. Forestry Service 2011 Ford F550 truck that was in great shape. After upfitting costs, the expense on the truck was less than \$30,000 which came in \$20,000 under the budgeted amount for replacement.

The service vehicle carries additional equipment to fire and rescue scenes that may be needed. Service 1 is housed at Station 1 and responds to most fire scenes and is often used for traffic control and special events.



## Video Camera Upgrades - Wireless Server and Body Cams

Changes in technology have caused our in-car camera systems to evolve. The first cameras in WPD cars were installed in 2002 and used VHS tape technology. The cameras today provide Full HD recording and this year we added a wireless server which uploads the recordings to a central server at the PD.

The new system integrates body worn cameras as well as three incar cameras. These cameras provide better documentation of police activity and have helped with both criminal prosecutions and in the event of personnel complaints. WPD uses WatchGuard Vista and 4RE camera systems. The wireless server gives us quicker access to recordings and provides a central means to send video evidence to the courts.




#### Citizens Police Academy - Session 10

#### Safety Equipment Funded by TML Grant

Our insurance carrier provided funding for cones, barrels and an electronic tablet for use in defensive driver training. The training was provided this year for all city personnel who drive city owned vehicles. The grant was a 50% match and was aimed at reducing property damage crashes.







Funding was also obtained for camera systems for our the Fire Department and Water Treatment Facility.
